

1. Meeting Called to Order

Mayor Berger called this meeting to order at 6:32 PM.

2. Opening Statement and Roll Call

Deputy Township Clerk Ciranni read the opening statement. Adequate notice of the holding of this meeting of the Howell Township Council was provided for in the following manner: (1) By the posting of a copy of said notice upon the bulletin board in the Township Municipal Building on January 8, 2020. (2) By copy of said notice to the Asbury Park Press, Tri Town News and Star Ledger for information and publication on January 8, 2020. (3) By the filing of a copy of said form of notice in the Township Clerk's office on January 8, 2020. The public will be allowed to attend and will be allowed to participate pursuant to the Open Public Meetings Law. The public is reminded that civility and decorum will be maintained during the meeting. Any contracts awarded at this meeting, or between now and the next meeting will be required to comply with the requirements of Public Law 1975 Chapter 127 (NJAC 17:27).

Mayor Berger announced that the Executive Session Minutes from tonight's meeting can be disclosed to the public at the next Regular Meeting, providing the need for confidentiality no longer exists.

6. Reports of Township Officials

- **Recognition** – Officer Jonathan Woolley and Amy Greenberger

Community Development Director/Deputy Township Manager Herrman announced that Assemblyman Sean Kean is here this evening to present a resolution to off-duty Howell Police Officer Jonathan Woolley and former Jackson Police Officer Amy Greenberger for their roles in saving the life of an elderly gentleman who collapsed while working out at a gym in Brick Township. Councilman Russo and Councilman Bonevich read proclamations that were also presented to Officer Woolley and Ms. Greenberger by the Governing Body.

Township Clerk Ciranni stated that changes on the agenda from Preliminary to Final Agenda include:

Deputy Mayor O'Donnell requested from Mr. Herrman a final report on shared services with the County regarding the trimming of trees. Mr. Herrman clarified that this goes back to the 2018 hazardous tree removal. He advised that the work was completed with Monmouth County using shared services to save money. Mr. Herrman advised that he met with County officials at the time and their shade tree employees were able to inspect the trees and remove the appropriate ones. This was done basically around the Manasquan Reservoir on Windeler, Georgia Tavern, Peskin, Southard and Manassa Roads. Some of those are County roads so the work was done at the County's cost. Others are Township roads and they performed the work for us. In total we spent just shy of \$27,000 in tree removal costs from the County which included labor, equipment, fuel, administrative fees, and the tree inventory which was just shy of \$2,000 to go out and inspect all the trees to determine which ones needed to be trimmed and which ones needed to be removed. That was completed in 2019. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated that there are a lot of hazardous trees in the Township due to the sheer size of the town. She added that there is a shade tree fund and requested that Mr. Herrman and Mr. Geoghegan to try to work up a plan on how much money we can allot from the fund to remove dangerous trees. Mr. Herrman asked if we would be utilizing shared services, utilizing our own forces, or contracting. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated that the County is very particular on what they use as guidelines for tree removal so the Township would possibly go out to professional services because they would have the equipment to take down very large trees. Mr. Herrman added that the County would not trim any trees around wires; they would ask us to hire a professional tree service. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell and Mr. Herrman discussed JCP&L's method of trimming trees. Mr. Herrman stated there is only a certain amount of trimming they can do under BPU regulations. He explained there is a new program through the BPU that allows them to cut down hazardous trees beyond the 10-foot envelope around their wires that are technically on private property. Last year the Township received numerous complaints from Equestra about their power going out and

they blamed it on the Township. We brought JCP&L to their facility for a meeting and JCP&L explained the process they go through and what it takes to trim a tree that is on private property. They have contacted the property owners and asked for permission to go on the property and remove the tree free of charge utilizing a BPU grant. At the time of the meeting with Equestra, JCP&L mentioned that their success rate was about 60-65 percent, meaning that that is how many people out of 100 who would allow them access to their property to remove their trees. Mr. Herrman added that recently JCP&L has made a concerted effort to go back on Yellowbrook Road where you will notice that they have trimmed a tremendous amount of trees on the northbound lane, which caused 9 out of the 11 outages that occurred in Equestra over the last year. Mr. Herrman explained that they only have grant money for certain streets so they put in a grant, they ask for certain streets, complete the specific streets, get permission from the property owners and then trim or cut down the trees. Mr. Herrman stated that we can also talk to their leadership team and say we would be open to them doing that on more streets to: a) help keep the power on, and b) potentially remove more hazardous trees. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated she was talking to Councilman Bonevich today about the possibility of changing the tree ordinance. They would like to possibly consider a tree-per-tree option and not have the possibility in place for developments to get a break on tree removal. Councilman Bonevich added that he and Mayor Berger had sat in with the Shade Tree Commission during discussions about problems with the ash trees and other trees, and how much it costs to trim the trees. Mr. Bonevich stated that the tree ordinance is 15 years old and costs have changed a lot in 15 years. Perhaps the Township could have a professional come in and look at the difference in prices and adjust the ordinance accordingly.

Deputy Mayor O'Donnell asked if there is a closing date scheduled for the MacKenzie House. Township Attorney Clark stated that there is not an exact date yet but it will probably happen in the next two weeks. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell also wishes to take a hard look at the ESIP (Energy Savings Incentive Plan) program to lessen energy costs in Township buildings. The school district did it and is saving money.

Mayor Berger wished to put on the record that the transfer station meeting was at the County level. They said that they have a preliminary report of the traffic study but they were not yet ready to share that information with anyone. Mayor Berger added that she thinks it is important for anyone who wants that information to start asking for it.

Councilman Russo discussed the recent incident that occurred at Five Guys where one of the employees called Howell police officers very bad names. The employee was immediately terminated. Councilman Russo expressed that the police officers and Chief Kudrick handled the situation perfectly and with class. Councilman Russo explained that there is going to be an event tomorrow at Five Guys from 5 to 7 PM where 100 percent of the proceeds will go to the PBA and encouraged everyone to go.

Councilwoman Richmond asked Mr. Herrman for an update on the park improvement plan. Mr. Herrman stated that he, Councilman Bonevich, and Councilwoman Richmond have been going over a park improvement plan the last few months. Mr. Herrman is going to obtain pricing for playgrounds, swings, repairs, fence work, and such for various parks in town. This can be done quickly under co-ops, and he hopes to have a resolution for the governing body at the next council meeting. Mayor Berger asked for a timeframe for the work. Mr. Herrman estimated that three months from the time of resolution to the time of installation would probably be a reasonable timeframe. Mr. Herrman stated that there have been quite a few years without improvements to the parks. He explained that the town has been concentrating on trying to acquire property over the last few years and is currently under contract on four locations that we are utilizing Open Space Trust funds to acquire, as well as some grant funding that we have. Mr. Herrman also hopes to soon present to the governing body an outline of all the additional improvements we would like to do based on the discussions we have had. These are also based on the Master Plan. Mr. Herrman stated he has asked some of the leagues that lease our fields and parks for their wish lists. Some items like parking lot paving or field rehabilitation might take longer because they require surveying, curbing, permitting, design plans, contracts, and public bidding. Councilwoman Richmond asked if the money is coming from Open Space. Mr. Herrman stated that all the improvements right now would be taken out of the Open Space Trust Fund, totaling about \$4.1 million. He added that the town is also paying for acquisitions out of that amount.

Deputy Mayor O'Donnell extended condolences to the family of Herbert C. Massa, who served as Assistant Superintendent of the Howell Township Board of Education for 32 years.

8. Hearing of Citizens & Public Comment on Consent Agenda Items

Mayor Berger opened the meeting to the public.

Adam Hochron, Pinetree Court. Mr. Hochron stated it was about nine years ago that he covered his first meeting at the old Town Hall. He talked about some of the many changes that have taken place in the Township since then. Mr. Hochron stated he hopes that in a National election year that will probably be as partisan and ugly as we have ever seen, that it does not come here. He expressed hope that the governing body can work together, particularly for non-partisan events such as Student Government Day. Mr. Hochron added that he is proud to live in Howell and feels that the governing body members do an amazing job and have good intentions, and that the residents, regardless of political party affiliation, just want to see the best from their government.

Joan Osborne, 28 Bronia Street. Ms. Osborne stated she was notified that the Township received a Sustainable Jersey Nature Conservancy grant to plant 700 trees in Winston Park; we are going to need groups to come out in April to help plant the trees. Mayor Berger asked if the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts will be contacted to help. Ms. Osborne stated that they have already received commitments on behalf of Middle School South, Aldrich School, Boy Scouts, Shade Tree Commission, and Lake Restoration and Wildlife Management Committee. Any groups or youths who need to do community service are welcome. Ms. Osborne stated this year is the 100th anniversary of celebrating Arbor Day and hopes it can be a Township-wide event on a Saturday or Sunday in April to plant the trees. Ms. Osborne discussed the issue of plastic bag ordinances. Several council members have met with middle school students interested in passing an ordinance at the local level. She explained that at the state level, legislation recently passed at the Senate level but did not pass at the Assembly level so ANJEC (Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions) is again asking that individual towns pass ordinances to increase the pressure to create a statewide solution on plastic bags. Some middle school students have submitted an educational video that they would like the Township to run on its TV station and possibly link to it on the website. Quick straw poll vote – governing body in favor of showing the video. Ms. Osborne discussed the Soldier Memorial Park concession stand ordinance that is on tonight's agenda. She hopes sustainable and efficient design is being utilized. Ms. Osborne also discussed warehouses and zoning and stated that every month the Environmental Commission views a new warehouse application. Ms. Osborne stated she does not want to see Howell turn into a place with trucks on every single road because there are warehouses everywhere. She asked the governing body to please urge the Planning Board to do something about zoning and rein in where we can put warehouses. Mayor Berger asked how many warehouse applications they have gotten – Ms. Osborne stated that last year they received about five or six, this year another one or two.

Tina Smilek, 33 Charles Street. Ms. Smilek thanked Mayor Berger for going to the SWAC meeting. She asked if the governing body can send a new letter to the Monmouth County Freeholders to tell them we are opposed to the transfer station. Mayor Berger stated she would have no problem doing that. Attorney Clark stated he can look into it. Councilman Bonevich mentioned that they had passed a resolution opposing it last year. Mr. Herrman stated that we have also asked for the traffic report to be sent to us once it is complete but we have not received it yet. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated she has checked with the Freeholders and they have also not received it yet. Ms. Smilek presented packets of information to the Councilmembers regarding State of the Town addresses. Ms. Smilek stated that the last presentation was done in January 2006 and hopes that one can be done next month. Ms. Smilek questioned agenda item 9A.9. Mr. Herrman explained that it is for the blinking light at Fort Plains Road and Hulses Corner Road which is so old that the sag in cable has caused it to be struck numerous times by tractor trailers and we cannot get replacement parts anymore. Ms. Smilek inquired about the Shared Service Agreement with Farmingdale for court services. Attorney Clark explained that Howell will be getting \$10,000 and he anticipates doing a true-up at the end of the year which will cover any costs that exceed the \$10,000. Farmingdale is also responsible for costs for their own judge, prosecutors, defenders, security, and transport of prisoners. If for some reason their session of court goes overtime, Farmingdale will have to pay overtime fees. Ms. Smilek inquired

about the proposed building at Soldier Memorial Park for \$1.2 million, which had started at \$750,000, and expressed concerns about paying for it. The Mayor and Councilmembers announced that they are going to be tabling this ordinance this evening because they agree that more research needs to be done on this subject.

Marc Parisi, 2 Castle Court. Mr. Parisi expressed concerns about the proposed noise ordinance on the agenda this evening. He discussed the history of changes to the noise ordinance and complications with its enforcement. Mr. Parisi requested that the governing body table it at this time. Councilman Bonevich announced that the governing body had discussed this ordinance with Township professionals and had already decided to table it for further research.

Kathi Novak, 16 Stratton Drive. Ms. Novak asked about the possibility of dredging Lake Louise or making improvements around the lake. Mr. Herrman explained that research had been done a few years ago about dredging Lake Louise and the cost was extremely high. He continued that we are currently participating with the County in a project to remove and replace the bridge and dam and proposing to install a small fishing dock, add sidewalk along the west side of Lanes Pond Road to allow fishing from the sidewalk, provide direct lake access for virtually the entire length, and also make minor improvements around the area for walkways and access. Mr. Herrman stated that dredging has not been revisited since 2017 when we last estimated the cost on that. Ms. Novak stated that since there is \$4 million in the Open Space Trust Fund, can Council revisit the subject since improvements are proposed. She also asked if property near the lake could be purchased to use as a park; Mr. Herrman stated that we are already working on that. Mr. Herrman stated that, for perspective, cost estimates versus actual costs, they had estimated Aldrich Lake dredging at around \$3 million and it came in at just over \$2 million; however, that was almost half the cubic yardage that Lake Louise needs. So a good rough estimate would be \$3.5 million to \$4 million to dredge Lake Louise, on top of the costs for all the other improvements. Mayor Berger asked Mr. Herrman if there are ever grants available for this type of work. Mr. Herrman responded yes and no; they are the same grants we are applying for now for other projects. There are not really any dedicated grants for that work. Ms. Novak stated she lives off of Maxim Southard Road and around the corner, less than a mile away, there is an application before the Zoning Board for four warehouses to be built. She stated that it is in a split zone; part is ARE-6 and part is SED. Ms. Novak stated that all the surrounding area is farms. It is rural except for the SED zone. Ms. Novak stated that she has heard the applicant has an online business. We have not heard from the traffic engineer yet. She continued that the only way in and out of that area is Oak Glen Road and Maxim Southard Road. Mr. Novak stated that the intersection of Oak Glen Road and Maxim Southard Road is very dangerous and there have been fatalities there. She added that it is important to take a really good look at these SED zones and warehouses.

Kristal Dias, 15 Mendon Drive. Ms. Dias inquired if the Shade Tree Commission could be included in a meeting to discuss using tree funds for the hazardous trees. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated she is not asking for a meeting for herself or the Council, she is asking Mr. Herrman to speak with Township Manager Geoghegan to devise a plan on how to allocate money to remove these dangerous trees. Ms. Dias stated there are nine very concerned members

on the Shade Tree Commission who would like to be part of that discussion as they are the advisory commission. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell agreed and stated that after they come up with parameters, she will ask Mr. Geoghegan to reach out to the Shade Tree Commission for their input. Ms. Dias stated there are grants out there as well that they are interested in exploring, rather than just going right into the trust fund. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell mentioned that the issue for tree removal in our town is that we do not have the equipment for the very large trees so we would have to go to a professional tree service. She added that she would ask Mr. Geoghegan and Mr. Herrman to search out grants for whatever monies are available. Ms. Dias stated that they have been working very hard on the tree ordinance verbiage to find some of the loop holes and fill those in. Ms. Dias also stated she is concerned about hazardous trees on county roads and in county parks and asked if there are any thoughts on getting a liaison with the Freeholders so when we have concerns we can have somebody to speak for us. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated that when something happens on a county road we can call the Township Manager and ask him to reach out and talk to the county. Mayor Berger stated that former Councilman Walsh had been a liaison between the Council and county. Ms. Dias asked if there were any plans on doing that again. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated she feels very fortunate that she can pick up the phone and speak with any one of the Freeholders at any time. Ms. Dias stated that all the damaged trees at the reservoir need to be cleared so we can re-forest and we do not have the power to do that because it is owned by the county. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated that we have a good relationship with the county. Ms. Dias asked if Deputy Mayor O'Donnell would be willing to make the call about the reservoir. Deputy Mayor O'Donnell stated that should would email and call.


